What: ProKids mobilizes our community to break the vicious cycle of child abuse and neglect.

How: ProKids helps our community to discover the power of investing in the promise of our children. We recruit, train and support community volunteers to speak up for children who have been abused and neglected and help guide them into safe environments where they can thrive. ProKids creates alliances within the child protection system to maximize outcomes for our children.

pages possible.

As ProKids was tabulating the outstanding 2019 numbers you will see in these pages, the reality of 2020 was dawning – but not too daunting for the ProKids community. We had served 1,009 children with a record-setting 310 CASA Volunteers, more than we expected, and helped keep 99% of them free from abuse and neglect.

But a storm was gathering on the horizon. A storm that was casting an even longer shadow of trauma on the lives of the children ProKids serves.



Alongside everyone else in our community, abused and neglected children were directly affected by the pandemic and related economic destruction. They became isolated in the places they called home. *Were they all safe?* We had more questions than answers.

As I looked at the outcomes from the preceding year, I knew one thing: with ProKids, our

community's most vulnerable children would have the advocacy they needed to protect them. ProKids is uniquely positioned for this moment because ProKids has been doing this work since 1981. There has certainly never been a year quite like 2020. There have been economic downturns. Despair. Upheaval. Through it all, ProKids has been there for abused and neglected children who have no one in their corner, just as it will continue doing for years to come.

In these pages you'll see the data that proves to me every day, every month, at every board meeting, that ProKids knows what it is doing on every level in the best interest of kids. These children are with their siblings, getting what they need in school, receiving the therapy and medical care they need and, most importantly, a home where they can be safe and thrive.

Even as the challenges we face shift and we expect more children to come into the child protection system, we can count on ProKids to change the childhood for abused and neglected children in our community, and change the future for all of us.

At a time when the world seems so uncertain to us adults, and even more so to children, I hope you can join me and ProKids in giving these children a chance at something that makes life so much more secure: a home.

As the pandemic was beginning, five children were removed from their mother and her boyfriend. Their violence had spilled into the street and a neighbor had reported it.

What really had been going on in their home?

Our concerns were confirmed as the ProKids volunteer took the oldest girl, 13, for a socially distanced walk near their relative's home. In her mask, the volunteer learned the young teen had been taking care of her siblings. There'd been ongoing abuse and neglect of her, her brothers and her little sisters, including the one who was just weeks old. After several weeks of isolation and lockdown, this girl finally had someone to trust.

Thanks to the training ProKids provides, the volunteer was able to respond appropriately, take the information back to her Advocacy Team including her CASA Manager and ProKids attorney, and advocate with them in court to help these children remain in a safe place.

This is why a CASA Volunteer is so critical for our community's children in crisis.

In my years at ProKids I've seen how our volunteers and our donors come together to keep our children safe and bring them through their trauma.

And as the reality of the public health crisis hit, our volunteers and staff did not need to be told how vulnerable our children would be. They just got to work.

ProKids volunteers made sure high school students had access to the internet to continue classes, that parents could continue to visit their children safely, that counseling was not interrupted so our children could heal, that court had the information they needed so a child's adoption could proceed.

ProKids kept advocating, no matter what, because of your support. We know there is hard work ahead. We'll need even more compassion, agility and grit.

We must bring these children hope and healing beyond the storm.

The ProKids Difference

In 2019, ProKids Advocacy Teams, including a **record-breaking** 310 trained CASA Volunteers, with staff CASA Managers and Attorneys, advocated for 1,009 Greater Cincinnati children.



Children who have been abused are more likely to be abused again.

99% of ProKids children were free from abuse and neglect.



On average, 16-17 year olds in foster care read at a **7th grade** level. **98%** of our children received appropriate educational placement or achieved developmental milestones.



The likelihood of stability decreases the more a foster child moves.

89% of ProKids children experience stability during their case.



Children placed without their siblings are more likely to be moved to another foster home.

70% of ProKids children were placed with their brothers and sisters.



80% of foster children have mental health issues; **25%** have 3 or more chronic health conditions.

97% of our children have access to the interventions and services they need.



1/3 of youth who age out of foster care have unstable housing.

100% of ProKids youth aging out of foster care have a place to live.

"Recent events may have made the plight of our children more apparent, but unfortunately there is a long history of disruption in the lives of the children in our community. When this happens, children find themselves in a large and complex system. When they meet a ProKids CASA Volunteer, these children find a caring individual who gets to know and understand them. And because these dedicated

volunteers are trained and supported by ProKids, they know how to advocate for these children and make a difference. We will need more of these kinds of

volunteers in the months ahead."

the child. This is why we need more volunteers to speak up for children who will need us now and in the future."




